## Meetinghouse Committee

Carolyn Miller, clerk of the Meetinghouse Committee, drew our attention to the excellent sign that was made by Steve Gorry. It has been placed by the road so that it can be read from both directions.

Carolyn then pointed out that we have long sought to replace the white plastic chairs that were an affordable choice earlier but take up considerable space and have little aesthetic appeal. Carolyn and others have done significant research to find alternative chairs of quality, with the result that a sample chair will be available for our consideration. Less expensive chairs are available, but the sample represents the best chair they have seen that is attractive, durable, compact, and, they hope, within our budget restraints. Discussions of the desirability of chairs with arms, cost, and financing followed. It was approved that the Meetinghouse Committee and the Finance Committee will confer and make recommendations to the next Meeting for Business.

## Treasurer's Report

Paul Diamond provided those in attendance with his report covering financial activity from 6/11/03 to 9/30/03. Expenses thus far are the usual. Discussion on the purpose of Worthy Needs and the need to make decisions on those expenditures followed. Funds are available in the budget for this year, and the Worthy Needs Committee should meet soon.

Copies of Claire Darrow's report on the very successful Container Fund Project were distributed and discussed.

Paul suggested during a discussion of the categories he has been using in his accounting that it might be a good practice, for the sake of clarity, to list meetinghouse funds in two categories with "grounds" as a separate category. He concluded his report by saying that income and expenses are about where they should be for this time in the fiscal year.

## Ministry & Counsel

Clerk Jean Crawford reported that the committee had approved Sally Wood's request for membership. In the

## Peace & Social Concerns

Clerk Holly Baldwin reported. There will be an educational forum and discussion on the Free Trade Agreement of the Americas (FTAA) on October 30. It will be led by Logan Perkins who is preparing to participate in the demonstrations against the FTAA meeting in Miami in November.

The Meeting accepted Claire Darrow's preliminary report on the Container Project and approved her suggestion that \$300 dollars from the funds raised by the project be given to the Restorative Justice Program as thanks for their presentation at the fund-raising dinner. Amid expressions of pleasure for the success of the project and of Claire's enthusiastic compassion for the group in South Africa, Friends agreed we will appreciate being kept informed of their activities. Paul Diamond interjected that the Diamonds' friend, Allen Quilly, of Quaker House in Belfast, Ireland, will be going to South Africa. (Some of us have met Allen and heard him speak a few years back.) He will be told about the Quaker Peace Center in Capetown and our contribution to their Restorative Justice center, with the possibility that he would visit while there.

Guy Marsden's proposal, "Many Hands Make Light Work," asks us to encourage the replacement of inefficient lights to reduce energy use as well as raise awareness of new technology and the importance of conservation. The project, explained elsewhere in this newsletter, was approved by Monthly Meeting.

Other items of discussion included the following:

- Holly Baldwin and Andy Burt are planning a program on holiday consumerism and the testimony of Friends.
- It was noted that packages for Iraqi infants are due Oct. 28th.
- After the rise of Meeting on 10/19 there will be a discussion of the casino issue.
- Holly will attend a meeting of area clergy on Habitat for Humanity.


## An Uplifting Event

## "Many Hands Make Light Work"

My first action of Earth Stewardship for the Meeting comes as a result of my participation in the Environmental Justice Program sponsored by the Maine Council of Churches at Chewonki.

My idea, which has been approved by Monthly Meeting, will replace the incandescent lamps in the meetinghouse with compact fluorescents (CFLs). I call it the "Many Hands Make Light Work" project!

Friends will have the opportunity to sponsor each Compact Fluorescent replacement. This will foster a sense of participation while also keeping this expense out of the general fund. We need to replace 23 lamps in total at a total cost of around \$400.

I plan on putting a board up on an easel in the lobby showing a floor plan of the building and circles identifying all the lamps. Sponsors can fill in the circles with a yellow marker and sign their name to each lamp they sponsor. A collection box will be placed near the board to receive the contributions.

I will search for warm tone lamps more pleasant than the typical blueish CFLs. There are 12 lamps on the dimmer in the meeting room that will require special dimmable CFLs that are more expensive. I have located a source at \$17.88 each, but hope to find less expensive ones with more research, the other non dimmable lamps are available for under \$12.00 each.

We plan to request \$20.00 per lamp and use the extra funds to acquire spare lamps. This round number would make cash contributions simpler.

## Farewell to the Phelps

On Friday, October 10, the Meeting held a farewell party for Susan and Paulding Phelps, who are moving to Crosslands in Kennett Square, PA. It was a time to thank them for all they have contributed to Midcoast and to wish them well. The gathering was joyful, the food was delicious. Susan and Paulding Phelps—members of the Midcoast Meeting family for over ten years during an extremely adventurous period in the history of this Meeting.

They joined in without stint or reserve in planning and building and furnishing the new meetinghouse, in finding the financial support, as well as the human support to make things happen.

During their stay here, Susan has been active on six committees: Ministry & Counsel, Finance, Meetinghouse, Hospitality, Nominating, and Landscaping. Her cheerful, quiet competence shows inside and outside our building.

Paulding has served on the Meetinghouse Committee, headed up the capital fund-raising effort, helped to find the property and to design these comfortable spaces that we are beginning to take for granted. He has been a member of Ministry & Counsel, he designed and led the Workshop on Aging, and he started and led the Book Group.

To say that we will miss them goes without saying: they leave a void in our Meeting family, which we must fill with fond remembrances and renewed energy. Between them, they have been vital participants in almost every aspect of Midcoast Meeting.

We wish them every success and happiness at Crosslands, where it is my guess they will quickly be involved in the life and activities of that community. It is wonderful they will be nearer their children. It is sad that they will miss the coast of Maine, but they will be back, as they go on sharing their lives with others. We all look forward to their visits with us.

## Maine Fair Trade Campaign Free Trade Area of the Americas Teach-In

Maine has lost more manufacturing jobs than any other state in the country in the last ten years. These jobs have largely been outsourced overseas, to places where corporations can pay less for labor and increase their profit margin. The practice of moving jobs overseas has been made possible and encouraged by trade deals such as NAFTA and the World Trade Organization. Now the Bush Administration is preparing to expand NAFTA to the entire hemisphere. A new trade agreement called the Free Trade Area of the Americas (FTAA) is being negotiated in secret by trade ministers and powerful corporate lobbies.

Are you concerned about job loss in Maine, increasing environmental devastation here and abroad, rampant poverty and unequal distribution of wealth in the world? Friends are urged to learn how all these issues are connected and what we can do about them. ## Global Warming: An Interfaith Service of Repentance and Renewal at the United Nations

Come to the United Nations on November 12 for the healing of the Earth—and ourselves.

There will come a time when the nations of the world will work together to protect this magnificent creation.

There will come a time when the nations of the world will honor the fish of the sea and the birds of the air and all creatures of the Earth as precious and holy.

There will come a time when the leaders of nations will weigh the impact of their decisions upon the most vulnerable of Earth's peoples and upon our children and grandchildren and generations to come.

There will come a time. And that time will come only when the people of the world speak with love and courage and strength and say, "The time is now. Creation is in peril. Our atmosphere, our oceans, our rivers know no borders. We must work together. It is time to care for this wonderful planet that has given us everything." November 12, 2003 will be such a time.

On November 12, five years after the United States signed the Kyoto Protocol, U.S. citizens will gather with members of the world community to speak with one voice about global warming and climate change.

Religious Witness for the Earth invites you to join in repentance, renewal, and solidarity with the rest of the world. We will gather as an interfaith community at the Community Church of New York and walk together, as brothers and sisters, to the Dag Hammarskjold Plaza across from the United Nations. There we will hold a Service of Repentance and Renewal.

We have invited members of small island states and other low-lying nations to join with us there. We have invited members of the world community whose governments and people have chosen to work toward the Kyoto standards even before the treaty is ratified. We come to ask forgiveness and to offer our gratitude and support. We come to recognize our interconnectedness and interdependence.

After our service, we will visit various UN missions. We will visit nations like Denmark, Germany, and the Netherlands that are curbing their greenhouse gas emissions to learn from them and offer our appreciation. We will visit nations like Bangladesh, Tuvalu, and Honduras—those most threatened by global warming—to offer our support and solidarity. And we will strategize together how to bring change.

We will work with other nations to bring a human face to the issue of global warming, using intercultural tours and international gatherings.

Here in the United States, where 4% of the world's population consumes 25% of its fossil fuels, we will consider how to change our government's policies and

our personal way of living.

There will come a time when the nations of the world will work together to protect this magnificent creation.

# An Interfaith Bus Trip to the UN

The Maine Council of Churches' Environmental Justice Program and its Interfaith Climate Change and Energy Initiative is organizing a charter bus powered by biodiesel fuel to take concerned Maine people to the United Nations in New York City on November 12 for an Interfaith Service of Repentance and Renewal sponsored by Religious Witness for the Earth.

Joining national religious leaders and other people of faith and concerned citizens, we will march from the Community Church of New York to the UN, where we will hold a service, followed by meetings with delegations from islands and other nations impacted by global climate change, delegations from countries that have ratified the Kyoto Protocol, and visit the BP Corporation. The day will conclude with a debriefing session.

The Maine bus (VIP charter line with video screens and comfortable seats) will leave on November 12 from the Park and Ride on Marginal Way in Portland at 1 am. We will stop for breakfast outside New York City. We will leave New York at 5:30 pm and arrive in Portland around midnight November 12. The cost for the roundtrip is \$55 per person, which includes a small fee to purchase Green Tags to offset the greenhouse gas emissions of the trip.

This is a historic, once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to witness to your concerns about global warming, to join with others in a powerful demonstration of compassion and action on behalf of our fellow Earthling as we reach out to those bound together by the will to turn back global climate change. We can celebrate the nations and peoples who are committing themselves and their resources to mitigate global warming; we can express our deep regret and ask forgiveness of those nations and their people who are already suffering severely from the effects of climate change. Please join us on the "bean" bus on November 12. It will lift your spirits and bring us all hope for the future.
